

TRANSPORT UPDATE



Fernwood has a new hourly Monday-Saturday bus service starting from Monday 8th January including evening and late night buses for the very first time. The 90 and 90C services operated by Vectare will pick up on the Great North Road (Tawny Owl side) and run via Balderton to Bay A at Newark Bus Station, then on to Farndon, East Stoke, Bingham and Nottingham.

The new six day a week timetable will see fifteen buses in each direction. On weekdays the first bus will leave Fernwood at 6.13am and run hourly throughout the day with a new late night service returning from Newark Bus Station at 11.48pm. Services on Saturdays will start from Fernwood at 7.20am and run hourly through the day with the last bus returning from Newark Bus Station at 11.10pm. There are currently no plans for a Sunday service. One morning and two afternoon weekday services will also call at Suthers School. The whole of the Parish Council welcome the news of improved transport for residents. The parish council has been banging the drum for more buses for Fernwood as one of our election promises and we are delighted that this will become a reality with all day and evening services including on Saturdays starting in January. Fernwood is Newark's fastest growing area with three new housing developments which will grow the parish from 1,200 dwellings to 4,000. We are very pleased that the public transport needs of our expanding parish are finally being recognised. And the extension of the £2 fare cap until the end of December 2024 will make the service particularly attractive from a cost point of view.

Our late former councillor colleague Julia Smith fought hard for more buses for Fernwood and secured our first ever Saturday bus five years ago. We am sure she will be smiling down on us in delight at this exciting news.

Don't forget!

You can also book the Lincolnshire Call Connect bus service by app or by calling 0345 234 3344. This service offers a pick-up and drop-off in Fernwood but must be booked in advance. It serves many of the villages between Fernwood and Downtown including Claypole, Dry Doddington, Foston and Long Bennington.

The £2 fare cap applies and concessionary bus passes can be used.






THE HISTORY OF RAF BALDERTON: PART 4 - THE AIRFIELD

Messrs W. & C. French Ltd, the major contractor completed the work of laying concrete runways by March 1943. The main runway was 6,110ft aligned 08-26 (compass degrees i.e. east/west), with secondary runways of 4200ft at 113-21 and 4211ft at 15-33 with 21 pan-type hardstands. Accommodation on the utility hutted sites catered for 2,413 persons. Stone for building the airfield was carried by lorry from Leadenham. The usual complement for a wartime airfield was three hangars, Balderton having two T2s and one B1 but two additional T2s were erected to store 32 Horsa gliders; two hangars were to the north and the rest south of the airfield.

T2 type hangars (T-transportable) was the standard temporary hangar for the RAF in WW2, 240 feet (73m) long, 120 feet (36.57m) wide by 25 feet (7.62m) high; constructed of welded and bolted steel typically clad in galvanized corrugated iron sheets (22 gauge for the roof, 24 gauge for the walls). The B1 type hangar had a width of 120 feet (36.57m), 230 feet (70m) long with a door clearance height of 27 feet (8.2m), the steel building weighed 135 tons (137 tonnes) with another 28 tons (28.45 tonnes) for the doors and guides. These were prefabricated buildings to supplement existing hangars on airfields.

Accommodation and working/technical buildings were typical of a 1940s airfield, utilitarian, in a variety of materials from wooden and Nissen huts to brick. The Nissen hut, a half-cylindrical skin of corrugated steel sheets, had many uses including accommodation, messes, churches, offices, armouries, workshops and stores. In three different internal spans of 16 feet (4.9m), 24 feet (7.3m) or 30 feet (9.2m); length was in sections in multiples of 6 feet (1.83m), usually with wooden or brick ends each containing two windows and a door frame; they could be erected quickly and windows and extra doors could be added to the sides by adding either a dormer window form or door frame by taking out a sheet and replacing it. Thousands of all the sizes were mass produced. The Quonset was the United States version.

Similar-shaped huts, the corrugated skin Romney, used mainly for stores and workshops but also messes and cinemas, had a span of 25 feet (7.62m) and be built in 8 feet (2.45m) lengths to suit requirements.


Temporary/Half Brick buildings were designed to have a life span of 10 years; a single brick wide with piers at 10 feet (3m) intervals. The walls supported a light steel frame carrying asbestos sheeting or board and felt roofing. Outside the brickwork was rendered with cement whilst inside the walls were painted, they had concrete floors. The Laing hut was of standard prefabricated lightweight timber wall sections bolted together; end sections had one central door 2 feet 8 inches (80cm) wide. Sides were usually made up of 10 sections each 6 feet (1.83m) and incorporating a steel half window frame which when combined with a left or right hand section formed a standard sized window. The walls were lined both inside and out with plasterboard and additionally the outside covered with felt. Lightweight composite roof trusses were spaced every 4 feet (1.2m) and supported corrugated asbestos sheeting outside and plasterboard inside, a single stove placed in the middle heated the hut.

By 1941 other types of hut had been developed. Seco or Uni-Seco Structures (the Selection Engineering Company) huts, a timber frame clad with asbestos sheets and a timber roof of shallow pitch with a plasterboard ceiling beneath. The prefabricated panels were a sandwich with a wood-wool filling between sheets of corrugated asbestos-cement.


THE HISTORY OF RAF BALDERTON: PART 4 - THE AIRFIELD

Handcraft Huts were made of bolted together asbestos sheets with cement rendered brick structures for the end elevations from the Handcraft Works in Watford, home of the Universal Asbestos Company Ltd. BCF huts were manufactured by the British Concrete Federation; these light huts were made from prefabricated sections of reinforced concrete. Prefabricated 'cruck' uprights on brick plinths held concrete blocks fixed horizontally to form walls, and steel trusses supported corrugated Asbestos roof panels. The huts were usually 65 feet (19.8m) x 18 feet 6 inches (5.6m) in size. Balderton's over 70 Technical buildings were a mix of Brick, Romney, Nissen, Laing, Handcraft and Seco construction.

Stores and Workshops were Romneys, the Radar workshop Seco, offices were Nissens as were the [air]crew locker and drying rooms, WAAF/RAF rest rooms and camera store; temporary brick was used for the Control Tower and guardroom. Handcrafts were used for camouflage storage. One somewhat unusual building at Balderton was two cottages requisitioned in 1941 and used for radio communications; surviving the war and demise of the station they returned to and remain in domestic use.

Pictures from Newark Cemetery website Cadet Couzin-Wood was buried in Newark Cemetery, Keith, pictured, was a member of the Southend-on-Sea Squadron of the Air Training Corps and from Leigh-on-Sea, the youngest of four. Accommodation on the various dispersed sites to the East of the A1 was mainly Nissen or Laing huts but at Balderton included some BCF and Handcraft. Huts lacked any sort of luxury, cold and damp with sparse heating in winter and, the Nissen huts especially, could be hot in summer with probably a mile or more to walk or cycle to and from their workplace for the airmen.

Accommodation Nissen huts was used for all ranks but space depended on the rank, officers had a room each with a batman's room for senior officers. Eight sergeants shared a single room while other ranks were 12 to a room.

Laing huts when used for accommodation housed six senior officers plus a batmen's room with a central corridor and a small stove for each room whilst airmen and women were housed 24 to a single room hut, airwomen had the 'luxury' of an internal chemical toilet but men used communal ablutions blocks. Heating was from a single pot bellied stove in the centre.
