FERNWOOD NORTH UPDATE

As Fernwood continues to grow, the Parish Council is actively engaging with developers and local authorities regarding the future of the new areas in our village, particularly Fernwood North. This encompasses the vicinity of the Barratt David Wilson sales offices, Hunters Road and area around Phoenix Lane.

Currently, this land is owned and maintained by the developers. The Parish Council are discussing the potential transfer of ownership and is seeking detailed information about the land and facilities that might be included, as well as the financial implications for maintenance. We've now had an informal meeting and requested detailed plans to understand the complexities. While we await updated information, please be assured that we are committed to keeping residents informed about any developments. Updates will be shared through the Gazette, at upcoming meetings and on social media.

- Made a challenging decision on land ownership in Central Fernwood
- Major village hall redevelopments including painting, landscaping etc.
- Researched Village Hall extension / storage options
- Met with the secondary school to discuss sports provision in Fernwood
- Fought to save the youth club
- Hosted our first Easter egg hunt around the village
- Agreed the lease on Balderton Hall for business & meeting hire
- Travel & transport survey plus recommendations to stakeholders
- Consulted on Persimmon planning application
- Consulted on multiple other planning applications including the school & CODE
- Welcomed new Councillor Oli Phillips

Plus many many more things! 2024 was a busy year for the Parish Council and we'd like to thank the office and staff team for all their support in the above activities, plus those not mentioned as well as the day running of Fernwood Village Hall. They do a great job of supporting local residents and we couldn't do it without them!



PARISH COUNCIL PRIORITIES 2025

During our January meetings, the Parish Council discussed potential projects for 2025. We also agreed our budget (see more later) for these projects. For many of the below we will consider using Community Infrastructure Levy to support; it is worth noting CIL can only be spent on certain projects. We welcome suggestions from local residents on how we could use CIL to improve our community. Please feel free to attend a meeting or write to the clerk with any ideas or requests for the council to consider.

- More events & community engagement projects for all residents including markets, summer and winter events, litter picks and coffee mornings.
- Continue to maintain Costall Woods & our green spaces including improved signage to make use of the Coat of Arms from the previous council.
- Redevelopment of the main play park with stakeholder support. This isn't a quick process but we look forward to sharing proposals with residents soon.
- Village Hall updates including new storage, redevelopment of the shower block and upgrade the stage, install a new sound system & CCTV system.
- The Hub will provide us with much needed additional space to expand, offer meeting & conference rooms, hot desks and additional parking.
- Continue conversations regarding transport & parking issues in Fernwood. Whilst not in our remit, this remains a priority in 2025.
- Continue to work with developers to benefit current & future residents. In particular we continue to ask for allotments to be provided!

Whilst this doesn't cover all the work we expect to undertake, it does give an idea of the Parish Councils key focus areas in 2025. We ask residents to be patient as we work to deliver these goals; in many cases the Parish Councils key focus need to work with multiple stakeholders to deliver these changes and are reliant on collaboration. Councillors are volunteers who dedicate our spare time to support the community and thank residents for their support in 2024.

THE HUB UPDATE

We are excited to announce that the Parish Council can now provide more space in neighbouring property Balderton Hall. This includes meeting rooms, business spaces and additional parking! Capacity at the village hall has been an issue for many years, with the old council looking into an extension and conversion previously. Back in 2024 it was agreed at a meeting that the Parish Council would lease a large section of Balderton Hall to provide more space, using Community Infrastructure Levy to subsidise the cost. It is conveniently located just across the car park!

We expect this to have a really positive impact for all residents and users of the village hall, as well as introducing some new activities for the village such as desk hire & conference spaces.

PERSIMON APPLICATION UPDATE

As we shared in December, the Parish Council held an extraordinary meeting in October to review the planning application made by Persimmon for 430 houses off the Great North Road. **It was agreed to object due to significant concerns** regarding highway safety, housing density, flood risks, and environmental impact. This application was then resubmitted by Persimmon. When the Parish Council met in January we were also advised by Councillor John Lee that the second primary school planned in this area (and noted in their application) will not go ahead. We again objected to the application as there were no significant changes in our view, and the potential impact or no secondary school would impact traffic in wider Fernwood.



The Council believes these issues must be thoroughly studied before any plans proceed. We are only consultees in this process and the decision lies with the planning department but we appreciate your ongoing support and will keep you updated on developments.

FERNWOOD LADIES CHOIR

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Anyone who attended the Fernwood Community Christmas in December will have had the pleasure of seeing the first public performance from Fernwood Ladies Choir. Despite only being in existence for six months, the choir has quickly become popular, with over forty members who meet weekly. Choir Master Kev Jason said “having run successful ladies choirs for well over a decade, when I moved to Fernwood, it was always my intention to start a community based, community run choir. In the 7 months, we’ve sung some brilliant modern songs, new friendships have been forged and confidence increased.”

Residents local and further afield are invited to join the choir on Wednesday at 7:30PM in the large hall at Fernwood Village Hall. Your first session is free then it’s just £5 on a pay as you sing basis. The choir are gearing up for more performances in the New Year so keep your eyes peeled for more information coming soon!



PARISH COUNCIL BUDGET

As we begin the new year, the Parish Council would like to provide an update on our budget for 2025 and the steps we are taking to ensure the responsible use of public funds. In light of ongoing financial pressures, the Council is committed to keeping costs down while continuing to provide essential services. In 2024 we put considerable work into stabilising finances which paves the way for smart decision making this year. At our meetings in January we have carefully reviewed all expenditures and explored more cost-saving measures across the board. This includes setting targets for income from rental spaces and hires, negotiating better contracts and prioritising projects that have the most significant benefit to the community.

Additionally, we are focusing on increasing local engagement and plan to expand events such as Community Christmas & Party In The Park which feel vital to building the community in Fernwood. We are also continuing to support community initiatives without putting additional strain on the budget through the grants system.

We understand the importance of being transparent and accountable; we will continue to work hard to deliver value for money and plan to report fully at our next meeting in February and on social media. for your continued support.

Dear resident,

Allow us to start our column in the latest issue of the Fernwood Gazette by wishing you and your loved ones a happy and healthy 2025. This column follows our autumn edition which focused on shining a spotlight on inspirational award-winning young people, the Council's green rewards scheme and the administration's Kidney Stones proposal... more on that shortly.

Cllr Jim Weale Condolences

It was with great sadness that we heard of the passing of Cllr Jim Weale, a founder member of Fernwood Parish Council, and an influential member of our local community. Jim was very encouraging, warm and welcoming when we were first elected to represent Fernwood at Newark and Sherwood District Council and was always happy to offer support and advice to new councillors for the greater good of Fernwood. Jim is sadly missed, and our prayers and condolences are with Mollie and their loved ones.

Kidney Stones Update

In our last column we assured residents that we were aware of concerns relating to the spend and location proposed for the Council's Administration's Kidney Stones project, and at the time we were awaiting analysed consultation responses to be presented to the Council's committees. You may well have seen that despite an overwhelming consultation response and the concerns raised by us and colleagues, the Council's political leadership voted to press on with the unpopular project. To be clear, and to reiterate the message in our last column, we recognise that Kidney's work is important and impressive; however, in our view the location and associated plans are wrong, as is ignoring the public consultation. When analysing the results of the consultation, 57.32% of respondents were unsupportive of the proposals. Only 40.75% were deemed to be 'overall supportive', and of these, 21.7% were against the location. This means that only 19.58% were supportive and not against the location, which is significant given that the professional advice in the Council's papers said "the focus of the consultation was on the specific location of Castle House in Newark".

So, what's next? Well, the leadership have decided to push on and are set to spend over £100,000 to display this artwork in a location that local people said no to. We are extremely disappointed and given that the highest number of consultation responses came from residents in our ward of Farndon and Fernwood, we know that much of the readership will be too.

Local Government Reorganisation

Residents may be aware that the Government has set out its intention to reorganise local government, with plans to remove two-tiers of local authority, and replace existing councils with new unitary authorities. Council Leaders and Chief Executives across Nottinghamshire are working together on plans for Government, though with big proposed reorganisation such as this, change takes time. When we know more, we will update our residents.

New Responsibilities

Finally, since our last column, the District Council's Conservative group has undergone a change in leadership. Resultantly, Cllr Jack Kellas has become Leader of the Conservative Group and Leader of the Council's Opposition, with Cllr Simon Haynes becoming the Group Whip, and Cllr Neil Allen leading on the group's approach to policy and performance meetings. Whilst we are all honoured to be taking on these new positions, our commitment remains steadfast in representing the residents of Fernwood, and of all the other parishes in our wonderful ward.

The HISTORY of RAF BALDERTON –

part 8 – Post War

RAF Balderton Research Group - Pete Stevens, Leighton & Debbie Topham & Colin Savill.

1 Bomb Store

Following the departure of No.227 Squadron when the Lancasters took off for Strubby in April Balderton was immediately closed as a flying station. Flying Control facilities ceased from 08.50 Hours on the 5 April 1945 when the airfield became available for emergency landings only and Flying Control, Intelligence/Operations and Meteorological Sections closed.

During May a number of Italian POWs were located on the station and arrangements made for their duties. On the 18 May 1945 Balderton [and Fulbeck] was taken over by No.93 MU and returned surplus HE (high explosive) and Incendiaries began to be received from No.5 Group Bomber Command stations. Storage space was also provided for continued receipts of HE from ports of discharge and from filling factories at home, collected ordnance - 4,000lb bombs and general ammunition from other disused stations - were stored on the runways. In June all stores were being returned by road and a report stated that both places would be practically filled by the end of the month and estimating that Fulbeck would have 10,000 tons and Balderton 12,000 tons.

The MU reported that in December 1947 the principal task was the inspection, checking, segregating and restacking of stocks left in the bomb dump at RAF Balderton by No.5 Group on disbandment.

In March 1952 Balderton had 43 4,000lbs bombs, Fulbeck having 398 and Goxhill 165. In August Operation Garden Shed saw incendiary clusters cleared from Fulbeck and the unit moved to Balderton on the 8th with clearance affected by the 20th when the party moved to North Witham, 1,159 tons were moved to M O S East Riggs munitions store during the month. A total of 2,200 500lb bombs were serviced at Balderton in May 1953 and in May 1954 the sale of empty bombs to [scrap] contractors was completed at Balderton.

Clive Shaw was stationed at Newton and as part of a team of ten travelled to service the bombs at Balderton, examining them for safety before their disposal. He recalled a group of trustees from Lincoln prison being used on the airfield; they would remove the brass nose fuses (these were only fitted 'finger tight') for selling as scrap! One night whilst on picket (guard) duty at Balderton the duty officer arrived in his car and found no one on the airfield – Clive and his mates were in the Turks Head pub!

No.1 Disposal Flight arrived on Operation Steering Wheel at South Witham on the 26 May 1954 to commence the uplift of 2,259 4,000lbs bombs held at South Witham, North Witham, Bottesford, Balderton and Fulbeck for deep sea dumping from Cairnryan; railway trucks being sent from the railhead (believed to be Redmile - the Air Ministry private siding at Bottesford West Junction on the old GNR Newark to Leicester line)..

Information was received in May that Balderton was to be cleared by 27 November 1954. However in June instructions were that Balderton had to be closed by the 31 August 1954 and No.2 Disposal Flight was posted in to assist the unit with this task and completed the clearance by the 31 August in accordance with the schedule.

2 Disposal Store

Balderton was transferred to No.40 Group Maintenance Command No.55 Wing on 1 June 1945 firstly as No.1 Equipment Disposal Depot then designated No.254 MU from 15 June. Its function was described as receiving and storing equipment in the A. E. D. Range.

The Medical Officer reported that the general health of personnel was good but a large percentage of Grade III personnel had been posted in causing higher than normal sick parades and some initial difficulty in arranging duties to fit in with their physical limitations.

In June the MU received items from 25 different stations including Benbecula and Stornoway in Scotland and Penrhos in Wales as well as more local stations including Fulbeck and Gamston. One T2 Hangar was in use as the Transport section whilst offices on the Technical site were converted to stores. Heavy ground equipment was being stored in the open.

In September an educational centre was created with a library, reading room and music room, a woodwork hobbies class, a domestic science class at Newark Technical College for WAAFs, A dressmaking class for WAAFs and co-operation with the Regional Nursing Authority for part-time experience for WAAFs in local hospitals.

The Airmens Christmas lunch was served on the 21st in lieu of the station being stood down on Christmas Day, Officers, WOs and SNCOs served around 500 RAF and WAAF personnel in one sitting and the newly formed station band rendered a selection of music. For many airmen and women this would be their last Christmas in RAF service.

No.4 Equipment Dispersal Depot was formed at Fulbeck as part of No.55 Maintenance Wing becoming No.255 MU in June 1945; it controlled other airfields including Saltby, Fiskerton and Leicester East and from July 1946 Balderton until disbanding on 30 November 1948.

A number of dispersal sales were held at Balderton during 1948 by Escritt and Barrell of Grantham with General Engineering, Industrial and Miscellaneous Plant and Stores, fine quantity Hand Tools, Photographic Equipment, Electrical, Radio and Radar Equipment, Carpenters tools, Machine tools and thousands of Bicycles included in the five auctions. The first sale in January as reported in the Newark Herald realised over £29,000 (in 2017 over £1 million) with 11,500 bicycles, 45,000 shovels and spades and 400 wicker baskets included. Single bicycles made £1,10s (£54), lots of 100 £62 (£2,226) and 'heaps' some 20 feet high made £25 (£900), Newark Laundry Co. were among the successful bidders for the baskets, single baskets made £2,10s, lots of five £6,15s and ten £14 (£504).



The second sale in February saw more bicycles, 4,000 canvas tool bags sold in lots of 400 selling for £162, grindstones with stands and steam jennies on two wheel trailers were amongst the items sold. Further sales were held in April, June and August.

RAF Balderton was pronounced cleared and closed on the 31 August 1954.

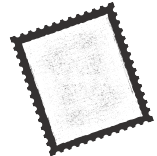
